Executive Leadership Summary

I am a passionate advocate for student success and the exceptional faculty and high-quality academic programs that provide the foundation for achievement. I lead forward-thinking, data-informed, high-impact programs designed to achieve goals of strategic importance to my university. I focus on strategic planning and communication as foundations for program development and success and easily navigate intra- and inter-divisional partnerships. I champion the cause(s) of those historically under-represented and under-resourced in higher education. Finally, I have developed creative responses to fiscal and physical resource limitations and have successfully captured external funding to support institutional initiatives.

Administrative Experience

Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs (Lamar University, June 2022 to June 2024)

Lamar University is home to over 17,000 students in Beaumont, Texas, and through its online education programs. Approximately 50% of Lamar's are graduate students, and the same percentage are in online programs. The university employs over 400 full-time faculty, many of whom are engaged in nearly \$10,000,000 of restricted research annually. Students select their majors from over 100 baccalaureate, master's, and doctoral degrees in five colleges (Arts & Sciences, Business, Education & Human Development, Engineering, and Fine Arts & Communication) plus the College of Graduate Studies and Honors College. It is also home to the Texas Academy of Leadership in the Humanities, a predominantly residential high school program for highly motivated students.

The Deans of all colleges report to the Provost, as do leaders of academic support units on campus, including the Division of Digital Learning, academic administration, assessment and accreditation, institutional research, international education, the John and Mary Gray Library, and research and sponsored programs.

Texas State University, a Carnegie R2 Emerging Research University, is home to 38,694 students enrolled in one of 98 undergraduate, 91 master's, and 13 doctoral degrees. Ranking 14th nationally for total bachelor's degrees awarded to Hispanic students, the university holds the federal designation as a Hispanic Serving Institution. University College was one of eight undergraduate colleges and home to academic and academic service programs.
